

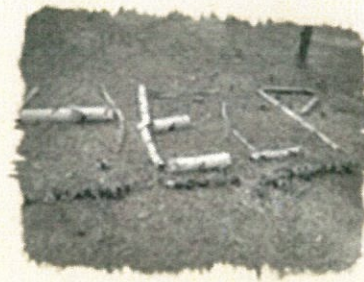

Woody Words to the Wise

- Use covered clipboard with pens, pencils and chapstick.

Environmental Education...

 ...is essential to today's world. Earth is faced with many problems. Students must understand how an environment works and know its delicate balance.

 ...ties together all sciences. In order to understand water quality, students must know the physical characteristics of its waters. In order to understand the ecology of an environment, knowledge of geography, climate, plants(flora) and animals(fauna) is important.
